Reflect on which of these types of assessments you use most and which of these do you use least?

I prefer to use activities that help people to connect, but understand that learners need time to reflect as well. So truly it needs to be a hybrid of activities to meet the needs of all students.

QA1: How was your course already designed to teach using a dual-delivery model?

- My class was already planned in the dual delivery model (my F2F class) and transitioned well, and my other classes were online. I wound up training colleagues to pivot.
- Universal Design for Learning strategies are relevant for all types of course design.

QA2: How did you change your teaching practice as you moved your course(s) online?

- My F2F class that transitioned online enjoyed peer review of essays. This afforded additional time to review and provide more in-depth time to give each other feedback instead of rushing in a 50 minute class.
- Exams were broken into several small chunks that students could take, in order, over the course of 12 hours.
- The peer review was conducted in a Discussion Forum.
- Lots of peer feedback in discussion boards or breakout rooms.

QA3: What successful communication practices do you use with your students, faculty colleagues, staff and administration?

- Weekly emails, weekly Zoom sessions, closed-captioned YouTube videos, animated video tutorials, discussion board sessions, mid-semester survey to check-in, Office hours via Zoom

QA4: How have you adapted assessments to make them accessible during the pandemic?

- In an online class, I have students give presentations via Zoom.
- Since I couldn't evaluate students' lab skills, I had them read much more primary literature that illustrated how tools were used. They worked in small groups and then led a presentation.

QA5: How did integrated learning technologies assist your teaching and significant learning for students since the pandemic started?

- Zoom breakout rooms were essential for small group work :-)
- Closed captioned video tutorials to align with learning modules that were quite detailed.
- Google doc for collaboration and summary of small group work.
- Our program is clinically focused and because covid prevented us from sending students to clinical. We used a virtual clinical patient assessment and had the students assess the patient virtually and create a care plan based on that assessment
- VoiceThread for final presentation to accommodate for time differences with international students



QA6: What strategies do you currently use to assess the quality of your courses?

- Early-semester evaluation and IDEA evaluation at end of the semester. Department assessment has let us determine if our courses are meeting our program goals.
- A mixture (informal/formal) - end of course surveys, self-designed surveys, test driving my course, peer review, curriculum committee review
- I enjoy creating an "application-styled" survey to ask how what they learn has been applied or will be.

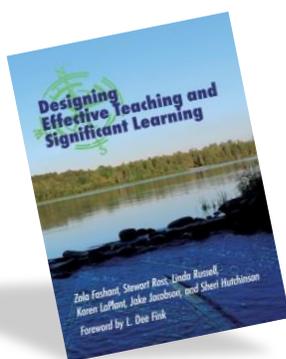
QA7: What do you think is the most impactful type of assessment to increase student's level of performance?

- I've found a combination of assessment styles can be quite impactful. Forward-thinking and backward-thinking to reflect upon meaningful learning that will now impact students in the short and long-term. I have also eliminated final exams. :)
- Karen shared that she got rid of the final exam and used a case study instead.
- Was that in class or take home case study?
- Karen answered in presentation that it was take home.
- Giving students a small project that requires them to apply what they know and learn more on their own. Example for non-majors biology - they learn about female reprod. system and then have to come up with a question that they still have, research it, and present it in a creative way.
- Case studies are awesome!
